Keeping children safe from abuse and harm

On 25th June the Government issued updated guidance on keeping children safe from abuse and harm which brought together sources of information about the main risks children may be particularly vulnerable to during the coronavirus pandemic. The essential measures that have been put in place to control the virus can potentially increase the risks to children.

Domestic abuse

The Government's advice to stay at home has never applied if a person needs to leave their home as a result of domestic violence. If you or someone you know is a victim of domestic abuse and you have a cause for concern regarding a child call the **NSPCC helpline** for advice and support on **0808 800 5000** or the **National Domestic Abuse Helpline** on **0808 2000 247**. If you are in immediate danger always call 999 and ask for the police. If you are unable to talk listen to the questions asked by the police and respond by coughing or tapping the handset where you can.

Child Sexual abuse and exploitation

When a child is sexually abused they are forced or tricked into sexual activities but they may not understand what is happening to them, or may be afraid to tell someone. Sexual abuse can happen anywhere, in person or online. It is never a child's fault and it is important that children know this. Crime, Criminal Exploitation and County Lines, violence and gangs

Children involved with gangs, county lines and criminal exploitation need help and support. They might be involved in violence, be pressured into doing things like stealing, carrying drugs or weapons or be abused, exploited and put into dangerous situations.

Protecting children from radicalisation

Although rare, increased online activity and feelings of stress and isolation may be exploited by online groomers to target vulnerable children including extremist influences seeking to radicalise vulnerable people.

Extremists may use the coronavirus outbreak to promote hateful views e.g. through conspiracy theories blaming a particular group for the virus, or through spreading misinformation about these groups responses to it.



ONLINE SEXUAL EXPLOITATION AND ABUSE



1 in 3 Internet users worldwide is a child



750,000 individuals at any point in time are estimated to be looking to connect with children for sexual purposes



Child sexual abuse is captured through images and videos that are being shared online. There are currently more than 46 million unique images or videos of CSAM* in EUROPOL's repository alone



Detecting and reporting this material helps rescue children from ongoing sexual abuse and prevents further trauma from their images being shared online

But the volume is growing exponentially: Of 23.4 million reports to NCMEC from 1998 to 2017, 40% were reported in 2017 alone



It affects children that are very young - 91% of CSAM assessed by INHOPE network in 2018 depicted children under 13 years of age

Online exploitation is often hard to recognise. Sometimes there are clear warning signs and other times less so. You will know your child best, talk to them about what they are viewing, who they are speaking to and how they are feeling. These resources may be useful

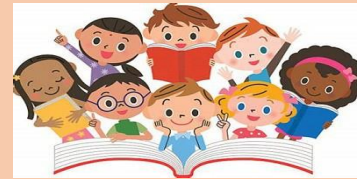
