Dear Parents and Carers,



Litter Picking

I spent a large part of my summer holidays litter picking. I run a litter picking group in Castle Point and my volunteers and I help clean up our local parks, woodland and streets. Over the bank holiday weekend, one of my volunteers stumbled across this crisp packet.

As you can see, the crisp packet has a best before date of 1997 which means it's 23 years old! Other than being a bit dirty and faded, it is still intact. This has really hit the message home to me about plastics – actually seeing something so old and so well intact presents the reality of plastic pollution but also the importance of slogans like “reduce, reuse and recycle”.



The Eco-team and I have worked hard to reduce crisp packet waste by joining the TerraCycle scheme where we can send off any crisp packets we collect in school to be recycled into plastic pellets. We also collect used pens which we send to William Reed School on Canvey who have joined up for the Terracycle Scheme for recycling pens. Please remember that used crisp packets, pens and batteries can be kept until we are ready for when we can start accepting them again. WWW Approach - do you know WHO your child is talking to online, WHAT they are doing online and WHERE they are going online ?

Parenting in the Digital Age doesn't need to be overwhelming. It isn't so different to parenting in the offline world. Use the **WWW approach** and make sure you know:

WHO your child is talking to online

WHAT they are doing online, and

WHERE they are going online

WHO

In the offline world, you want to know who your children are talking to and who they might be contacted by. It's even more important online where people may not always be who they seem, and advice received online can seem persuasive even when it's bad advice. There are plenty of things you can do to help your children manage **WHO** they interact with online.

WHAT

As parents we all know that children push the boundaries in the real world. Online is just the same. They can be led into doing things 'for a laugh' or because of peer pressure – so you'll want to keep yourself informed. Find out **WHAT** your child is doing online – are they sharing pictures of themselves, are they always kind to other people online, do they 'hack' their friends' accounts or post comments on YouTube?

Children shop online, just like adults, but they may find it harder to spot a scam. They might not know that it's illegal to download some things, like films and music from pirate sites.

WHERE

There are places you wouldn't like your children to go in the offline world. The betting shop, an 'adult' cinema or nightclub. There are similar risks online. As well as talking to your children about where they go online, you need to think about some rules and make some decisions.
