Message from the Principal

Dear parents and Carers,

Thank you for your continued support and partnership over the past few weeks. The reopening has been positive and our children are coming to school demonstrating resilience. They enter the academy with confidence and are engaging well in academy life and routines. Now procedures are underway and known to adults and children please ensure that we maintain our fluid entry and exit procedures by –

- Arriving promptly and departing swiftly

- Taking preventive steps to reduce gatherings and loitering

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Around the Academy continued...

Year 1 have been exploring what makes aeroplanes fly this week. We have found out about the Wright Brothers and the first powered flight and we have been making, testing and improving paper aeroplanes. We have read one of our old favourites 'The Gruffalo' and we have then written our own shortened version.

With Autumn approaching, **Year 2** have been investigating the changes in the seasons. We have been identifying the climate changes; evergreen and deciduous trees and discussing autumnal vegetables. The children have enjoyed doing observational drawings of deciduous trees, looking at the changes of colour taking place. We have been on a leaf hunt and have identified a variety of tree types. This has linked nicely to our writing focus of the 'Enormous Turnip'. The children have been amazing at retelling the story using actions and using a variety of adjectives to describe their gigantic vegetable of choice.

Year 4 have really been making us proud and slipping back into school routines so well this week. In writing we have been creating non-fiction reports on how to improve our environment in Leigh-on-Sea by reducing litter pollution. This theme has run through into our geography work this week as we looked at the physical features

of the world and how pollution affects them. Healthy eating has been our theme for PSHE lessons so far this term and the year 4's have enjoyed understanding the importance of a good night's sleep.

CHALLENGE FOR CHANGE!

The world around us is always changing. The change can be sudden, scary and unpredicted. Still, change is also an opportunity to use imagination and creativity to find new ways to adapt the world around us for the better.

To support young people with the challenges that come with change The Royal Town Planning Institute and Agent Plan-It would like to invite you to take part in Challenge for Change!

The Challenge for Change competition supports the teaching of subject areas such as art, geography, citizenship, STEM and ICT. It will also ask your pupils to think creatively and problem-solve.

The CHALLENGE

In no more than 200 words, Agent Plan-It would like the children to use their imagination and planning skills to create improved and sustainable communities? Children are encouraged to consider three core sustainability principles:

- 1. The environment how can we create healthier places and spaces whilst adapting to climate change?
- 2. Their daily lives how can we make travel to and from school or work safer and more sustainable?
- 3. Their local communities how can we share spaces and ensure that life is happier for everybody?

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Time Tunnel Challenge

We have decided to extend our time tunnel artwork competition. You or your child would need to complete a piece of artwork related to the following historical periods:

Invaders and Settlers: Romans, Anglo-Saxons and Vikings Tudors or Stewarts: Kings and Queens, the Great Fire of London World War 1 or 2: the Home Front, a soldier in uniform, poppies

The displayed work can be made using any media or multimedia or artistic style or technique, e.g. print, pastel, collage, pop art, pointillism.

The board sizes are A1 and original entries can be this size or we would look to enlarge or mount them, if this is not possible. We can also provide A1 paper if you do not have access to it.
