Message from the Principal

Dear parents & carers,

This week I have been popping in and out of our virtual classrooms to say hello to our children and to see them in action. It has been wonderful to see an array of friendly faces on screen and to engage in the sessions with them. I have also enjoyed seeing parents working alongside, providing support to our younger children too. Thank you for everyone's engagement.

This week, I joined Jellyfish class as we went on a magic carpet ride together and embarked on an adventure looking for a bear. I wore my teddy bear ears and lots of the children had accessories and teddies too. Together, we went on a bear hunt, through different settings until we found the bear. Miss Wise, dressed as an explorer with her binoculars at the ready, led the way. The children used their sound talk and strategies to help write the words to the story, developing their early literacy skills. Thank you Miss Wise for your creative lesson. I have also enjoyed visiting Mrs Cooke during a reading lesson. They are studying the text, 'Giant', by Kate Scott. It is a book that celebrates friendship and the power of being true to yourself. It addresses the question, Have you ever felt like you don't measure up?

I also attended a couple of history lessons. One lesson focused on the key question, 'Was it a good idea to ration food during the war?' children contributed to discussions demonstrating an understanding of the time but also considering their own personal responses. Discussions included reflections on family meal times, food choices and what it would be like for someone who was a little fussy with food. This week's visits also included some math lessons with children practicing and applying their number skills,

I think that you will all agree that the children have risen to this new way of learning very well. This week, we focused our learning based on the story of 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt', by Michael Rosen. On Wednesday, we went on a magic carpet ride that was tremendous fun! We are impressed with the children's increasing phonic knowledge and their handwriting is getting smaller and neater every day. Well done, children! Remember to nip, grip and flick to have good control of the pencil. In Maths we have been thinking about one more and one less. It is lovely to see that the children are becoming increasingly confident with their number work. The teachers enjoy seeing all of the work and videos that you are uploading to Tapestry, so thank you.

This week **Year 1** have been working very hard both at home and in school. We have enjoyed going on an adventure with The Snail and the Whale and writing our own creative sentences and exploring our imagination to make them exciting and interesting. In maths, we have explored time and movement, learning how to add hours and half hours to a time and exploring different kinds of turns. Finally, we learnt all about climate change in our topic lessons and enjoyed listening to the story 'The Lonely Polar Bear' by Khoi Le. Well done to all our Year 1 students and to their families at home who are supporting them. You are all working so hard and we are so proud of you!

This week in **Year 2**, we have been considering whether there was anyone to blame for the Great Fire of London. This led to discussions about responsibilities and whether there should still be consequences when accidents happen. Year 2 shared lots of thought-provoking ideas and points of view! In our writing, we imagined we were in the centre of London as the Great Fire of London unfolded and considered what we might experience (see, hear, smell and feel). We have also been able to do some junk modelling of houses. We questioned what materials may make a house suitable for shelter and explored whether the tallest house is the strongest!

In **Year 3**, we have been working hard either at school or by remote learning at home and studying changing climates in our topic lessons. Across six recent live lessons, the children have been learning about the effects of our changing climate around the world due to the use of fossil fuels. The children have been engaged in

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discussion on how to improve the problems we are facing, by creating poster, videos and songs on how we can make changes to the climates for the better.

Well done **Year 4** you have shown true determination in adapting to remote learning. We are proud of the way you have applied yourself in using the technology (even when feeling a bit nervous) and thank you parents for your support as it would be an impossible task without you. In maths we have been learning how to add and subtract fractions, with the help of a bar model. We applied these mathematical skills to solve word problems with some children creating their own maths stories – chocolate, sweets and pizza seemed to be a common theme! In English we have enjoyed writing a diary entry about the day we met our goblin and I know that the year 4 teachers have loved reading about the goblins you have created. In our topic lessons we have been looking at the history of the Roman invasion and how the Latin words spoken then are still used today. TTRS battles are very close as I type this Swordfish are in the lead! Remember year 4 to upload all your amazing work.

This week in **Year 5** we have been learning about the life of a soldier in the trenches. We explored how the trenches were designed and the important roles each solider had to keep the trenches running. The children were great at putting themselves into the place of a soldier during this time and expressed how they would be feeling in the form of a diary entry. In maths, we have been learning about different types of measurement-length, capacity and mass. The children have been converting different units of measurement and applying these to real-life scenario word problems. All of the year 5 team would like to say a massive well done to all of you for being on time for your online lessons, always being equipped and ready for them and participating in the lessons with maturity and enthusiasm. Year 6 have been really enjoying their History topic. This week we have looked at the role of women in World War 2 and the children created posters advertising for women to apply for different jobs. We also learn about life in Victorian times and the children were shocked that children had to get jobs and work in those times!
