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Eco Week Special

For our Eco-week, we decided to focus on the ten themes of Eco-schools: Litter, Waste, Transport, Water, Energy, Biodiversity, School grounds, Marine, Global citizenship and Healthy Living through lessons and visitors and across all aspects of our school. We also wanted it to be a celebration of our local community.

In Nursery and Reception, the children constantly work hard to recycle and pick up litter. Many aspects of the Early Years curriculum build upon the themes of Eco-schools such as learning using our outdoor areas every day and encouraging healthy living through the snack areas.

Year 1 have focused on ensuring they are using their recycling bins well. In addition, they made links to their topic by learning about the effects of light pollution.

Year 2 made different moving vehicles from recycled materials which they have been planning and designing this week.

Year 3 have been thinking of different ways they can help the Earth as part of their 'How do I look after the world?' Focus theme this week.

Year 4 children have been writing about the catastrophic fires in Australia. The children have been really passionate about helping the planet and linking it to their topic on chocolate by making placards about deforestation.

Year 5 looked at the environmental impact of Fairgrounds, which is their focus for enquiry in their Curriculum this half term. They debated the reasons for and against fairgrounds, looking at problems such as litter, destruction of animal habitats and pollution.

Year 6 decided to focus on biodiversity and school grounds. They started the week with making a pledge of what they would do to help the environment, as part of our 'How do I?' focus topic. They then looked at the range of animals and invertebrates that are present in our local area and on our school grounds, making bird feeders out of seed, raisins and vegetable fat to attract birds to our school grounds, as part of the RSPB Great Bird Watch.

We have had several visitors this week. Alicia Hogarth from Southend XR joined Year 6 to talk about climate change and its effects on our future. The children enjoyed asking engaging and enthusiastic questions.

Sam Pitman, the co-founder of Eco Essex, met with the Eco-team so they could show her what we do as an Eco-school to help make our school more environmentally friendly.

Finally, we had Wayne Dixon and his dog, Koda come and talk to the children in assemblies and classes about litter and waste. Wayne has been litter picking across the UK since 2016 and was named the first Litter Hero Ambassador by Keep Britain Tidy. They now have over 250 ambassadors across the UK, including our own, Mrs Powell.

And our week isn't over! On Saturday 1st February, we plan to host our first Community Litter Pick on our field and in our local area.

Wayne discussed why it is so important not to leave litter in the streets and how careful we need to be with how we choose to dispose of our rubbish. He was happy to hear that the Reception children already sort the rubbish in our classes as we put our fruit peelings into a separate bin ready for composting. During maths we have even used food packing to discuss and learn about the names and properties of 3D shapes in the environment, such as tins of baked beans. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning about Chinese New Year throughout the week and have made dragons, willow pattern plates and various other creative items, which look amazing.

Please ensure that your child brings a named water bottle in to school at the beginning of a week. We fill them up daily with fresh water and send them home at the end of a week for an extra good wash. Thank you for for continued support. Have a lovely weekend. **The Reception Team**
