The gap between the achievement of disadvantaged children and their peers has narrowed to just 3% compared to a 17% gap in 2015.

85% of our disadvantaged children passed the Year 1 check which is 19% higher than national in 2015. Last year at this school there was a 14% gap between the achievement of disadvantaged children and their peers, but this gap has closed to just 3% this year.

The attainment of disadvantaged children was below that of their peers. At ARE (Age Related Expectation) the gap was 18% in reading, 23% in writing and 22% in maths, and at above ARE the gaps were 9% in reading, 17% in writing and 13% in maths.

However, in reading 94% (32/34) disadvantaged children met their target based on end of EYFS and 53% (7/34) exceeded their target. In writing 88% (30/34) met their target, with 50% (17/34) making more than expected progress and in maths 85% (29/34) met their target and 53% (18/32) exceeded.

The gap between disadvantaged and other children in Year 6 has not closed despite the intense interventions in place including the on-going Breakfast Club led by two LSAs. 28% (8/30) PP children achieved national standard in all three subjects combined compared to 58% of other children. The allocation of resources is under urgent review to ensure that we are investing in staffing, resources and interventions that have an impact on both social and academic development of our Pupil Premium children.

<u>Attendance</u>

The table below shows that overall absence and Persistent Absence (PA) has improved steadily over the last 4 years.

Persistent Absence fell significantly in 2015 and was well below national.
