Achievement \* Belonging \* Confidence \* Determination \* Excellence






### **Taking an Accelerated Reader Quiz**

The ultimate steps to achieving amazing Accelerated Reader results.







- Check that it is in your ZPD range
- · Look at the cover
- Read the blurb
- · Look for authors you like
- · Read the introduction
- · Read the first page



2 Read your book



- Read for 25 minutes everyday
- Record what you're reading in your reading log



3 Search for the quiz



- Go to your Renaissance Place and select Accelerated Reader, type in the book's quiz number and click Search
- You can find the quiz number on the AR label
- · Select how you read this book
- Click Start Quiz



- You will have 3, 5, 10 or 20 questions to answ
- Read the question and all four answers
- Ask a teacher to explain a question you don't understand.
- · There are no time limits
- Click on the stars to rate the book
- · Check your TOPS result





### **Star Reader**

Children take a Star Reader test in school every half term.

The results of this test, provide the children with a ZPD reading range and the teachers with a reading age.

# What does your ZPD mean?



### <u>Accelerated Reader Quizzes (at home and at school)</u>

- An AR quiz is completed by children only <u>after</u> they have finished a book.
- There are usually between 5-10 questions on the book that has been read. At the end of the quiz the students are given a percentage to show them how well they have done.

### **Guidelines for taking quizzes:**

- The book <u>must have been read in the last two weeks</u>.
- 2) Have the book to hand when taking the quiz (Remember AR is not a memory test but measures reading ability)
- 3) Quizzes must be done independently.





# Helping at home


According to Renaissance Learning's research, children who read at least 20 minutes a day with a 90% comprehension rate on AR quizzes see the greatest gains.

Completing AR quizzes is part of our homework expectations!

### AR - Accelerated Reader

Read with your adult/independently daily. Aim for 20 minutes every day but keep on reading for pleasure.

Remember to choose an Accelerated Reader book matching your ZPD. Once you have finished your book, complete the quiz online.





Children's understanding of what they have read is the key to success and enjoyment of reading. It allows children to challenge ideas, collect a wider range of vocabulary and become creative writers as they use the language they have acquired to improve their writing.

# Creating a positive reading culture

Read at

- Keep sessions relaxed
- Give lots of praise
- Talk about the book afterwards
- If your child struggles over a particular word, try to find ways to help them remember it
- Don't give up on the bedtime story, even if your child is a good reader.
- Taking it in turns to read parts of the story.
- The more stories and books your child hears, the more they will want to read.
- Be a good model for your children let them see you reading
- Remind your child that reading is an essential life skill

### Literal Retrieval

- Where does the story take place?

### Structure

- How do headings help you when you scan the text?
- How does the layout help the reader?
- How does the title of the story encourage you to read more?
- What is the purpose of a caption?

- What does (word/phrase) mean?
- Which words has the author used to make the writing sound more formal/informal?
- Why has the author used ... (italics, bold, exclamation marks, headings, bullet points, captions etc.)?
- What has the author used in the text to make the characters sound funny/sad/angry?

### Writer's Viewpoint

- Why does the author choose this setting?
- What makes this a GOOD story?
- What effect do you think the story has on the reader?
- Could the story be better? What would you suggest?
- What impression does the author want to give of this character?

### **Darlinghurst Reading** Questions

Listen to your child read for 15-20 minutes every night. As they are reading, choose 3 guestions that you think will show or deepen their understanding of what they have read.




















# Lower Key Stage 2 suggested reading list



### Upper Key Stage 2 suggested reading list






















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


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





